IF YOU ARE LOST, OR IN NEED OF EMERGENCY SUPPLIES OR MEDICAL CARE, use this Ground-Air Emergency Code to signal to search planes. The signals can be stamped into the snow or made with brush in a cleared place. They are taken directly from the Air Force Survival Manual and will be understood by all planes.

The bighorn hunt areas are closed to all other hunting except migratory birds, small game and predator hunters with shotgun only, and except that it shall be lawful for the holder of a valid bighorn tag to take predatory animals. Bighorn tag is not valid for the taking of predatory animals after a sheep has been killed. The use of dogs except for small game hunting is prohibited.

CHECKING STATION LOCATIONS:

Checking stations will be operated at Gila Bend, Kingman, Salome and Yuma in the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service office at 356 First Street. Checking station hours will be in accordance with Commission Order P-33 and operated as permanent checking stations EXCEPT the Yuma Station will operate during the hours of 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Each hunter must personally check in at a checking station before hunting and must personally check out before leaving the hunt area. Successful hunters must personally check the head and carcass through a department checking station.

Bighorn cannot be lawfully possessed outside of the specified hunt area unless it has the proper seal attached to the horn by the checking station operator. FAILURE TO CHECK IN AND OUT OF THE CHECKING STATION OR FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH ANY SECTION OF THIS ORDER IS A VIOLATION.

T-12, JAVELINA HUNT REGULATIONS

SEASON: March 1 - March 30, 1963, inclusive

LEGAL ANIMAL: One javelina, any age, either sex.

BAG AND POSSESSION LIMIT: One javelina, See Commission Order P-36.

OPEN AREA: Statewide, EXCEPT Three Bar, Santa Rita, Tucson Mountain, Robbins Butte, and Arlington Wildlife Areas, and Game Management Unit 20, and posted portions of the Cibola and Topock Wildlife Areas.

A valid Class F or G license and valid javelina tag must be in possession of any person hunting javelina.

FORT HUACHUCA MILITARY RESERVATION SPECIAL JAVELINA HUNT:

SEASON: March 1 - March 30, 1963, inclusive.

NUMBER OF PERMITS: 125

DESCRIPTION OF AREA:

The Fort Huachuca Military Reservation lying within Game Management Unit 35.

The Fort Huachuca Military Reservation shall be open only to hunting by properly licensed civilian and military personnel attached to Fort Huachuca.

Hunters will be selected by drawing with the numbers of civilian and military hunters to be determined on the basis of the ratio of civilian to military applications. Application blanks will be available beginning January 28, 1963, at Fort Huachuca. Applications will be received at Fort Huachuca on or after January 28, 1963, and before noon on February 15, 1963, and quota for the hunt will be filled by public drawing at Fort Huachuca in the presence of Arizona Game and Fish Department personnel on February 15, 1963. Permits will not be valid until countersigned by the Commanding General, or his representative, at the time and place designated by him.

All hunters must personally check into and out of the area through a checking station as designated by the Commanding General.

T-13, SPECIAL ARCHERY JAVELINA HUNT REGULATIONS

SEASON: January 1, 1963 - January 31, 1963, inclusive.

DESCRIPTION OF OPEN AREA:

All of Game Management Units 23, 26*, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32 and the Tucson Mountain Wildlife Area.

NUMBER OF PERMITS: No limit.

LEGAL JAVELINA: One javelina, any age, either sex.

BAG AND POSSESSION LIMIT: One javelina, (see Commission Order No. P-36).

Special archery javelina tags will be available for this special season at the Phoenix and Tucson offices of the Department and all license dealers beginning August 15, 1962, and continuing through the duration of this season.

A nonresident wishing to purchase a license and tag must submit in addition to \$1.00 for the archery javelina tag, \$25.00 for a nonresident Class F combination hunting and fishing license, or \$20.00 for a nonresident Class G general hunting license or \$15.00 for a Class I archery license. Payment must be made by money order, cashier's check or certified check and made payable to the Arizona Game and Fish Department and mailed or delivered to the Phoenix office of the Arizona Game and Fish Department. Cash is acceptable when applying in person at the Phoenix or Tucson offices of the Department beginning August 15, 1962.

A resident participating in the special archery javelina hunt must have a valid Class F or G license and archery javelina tag and a nonresident must have a valid Class F, G, or I license and archery javelina tag while hunting in or possessing a javelina taken during a special archery javelina hunt. No hunter may purchase more than one special archery javelina tag.

Predators and small game in season may be taken by archery hunters by bow and arrow only during the special hunt. After a javelina has been killed the permit is not valid for the taking of predators or small game.

*In addition to a Class F, G, or I license and javelina tag, a hunter desiring to hunt in Unit 26 must purchase and have in possession a SAN CARLOS javelina archery permit.

T-14, BEAR HUNT REGULATIONS

SEASON: September 1, 1962 - February 28, 1963, inclusive.

OPEN AREA:

Statewide, EXCEPT Management Units 12, 13, 33, 34, 35 and 36 and elk hunting units during the open seasons for this particular species, except as specifically stated in Commission Orders No. T-4, T-8, T-9, and T-10.

BAG LIMIT: One bear, any age, either sex.

SEASON: March 1 - March 10, 1963, inclusive

LEGAL ANIMAL: One javelina, any age, either sex.

BAG & POSSESSION LIMIT: One javelina, See Commission Order P-36

OPEN AREA: Statewide, EXCEPT Three Bar, Santa Rita, Tucson Mountain, Robbins Butte, and Arlington Wildlife Areas, and Game Management Unit 20, and posted portions of the Cibola and Topock Wildlife Areas.

A valid Class F or G license and valid javelina tag must be in possession of any person hunting javelina.

FORT HUACHUCA MILITARY RESERVATION SPECIAL JAVELINA HUNT:

SEASON: March 1 - March 10, 1963, inclusive.

NUMBER OF PERMITS: 125

DESCRIPTION OF AREA:

The Fort Huachuca Military Reservation lying within Game Management Unit 35.

The Fort Huachuca Military Reservation shall be open only to hunting by properly licensed civilian and military personnel attached to Fort Huachuca.

Hunters will be selected by drawing with the numbers of civilian and military hunters to be determined on the basis of the ratio of civilian to military applications. Application blanks will be available beginning January 28, 1963, at Fort Huachuca. Applications will be received at Fort Huachuca on or after January 28, 1963, and before noon on February 15, 1963, and quota for the hunt will be filled by public drawing at Fort Huachuca in the presence of Arizona Game and Fish Department personnel on February 15, 1963. Permits will not be valid until countersigned by the Commanding General, or his representative, at the time and place designated by him.

All hunters must personally check into and out of the area through a checking station as designated by the Commanding General.
